# **VOICES OF IMPACT**

## Jerlyn - Education Lead at The Owl House

My journey at The Owl House began as a learning facilitator which involved me working with a different age group as compared to my previous work. However, at The Owl House I continue to put to practice, hone and build upon the strategies I learnt through my course and previous work. Seeing an impact reflected in the students' work boosts my confidence almost every day.

Taking up the role of an Education Lead has furthered my knowledge of the domain and helps me understand the need and nature of structure in a vocational centre. Having had the space and opportunity to build processes from scratch has been humbling and inspiring, all at once.



I joined The Owl House as Learning Facilitator and immediately jumped in to supporting the launch and operations of our very first fellowship program. The fellowship's goal of fostering inclusion and awareness resonated deeply with me. I loved the way it brought together passionate individuals from diverse walks of life and equipped them to become ambassadors of inclusion. Through the fellowship, we have been able to humbly support education and vocational organisations by assisting in their daily training sessions, planning for teaching-learning materials and assistive classroom tools, and contributing to the development of holistic, standardised checklists for inclusive student progress tracking.

My love for the program motivated me to contribute in every way I could, and within six months I was entrusted with the role of Fellowship Program Lead. That transition not only boosted my confidence but also gave me greater clarity about the value and impact of my work.

We relocated from Bangalore as our son found it difficult to cope with the stress and overexpectations in schools. Wanting to provide him with a calmer environment, and with his father being from Goa, we decided to move. When we came across Owl House, we were immediately drawn to it, particularly because of their emphasis on developing specific skills that can prepare students for future employment.

Aryan has always been hesitant with new people and unfamiliar skills, so his transition was gradual. It took almost a year for him to feel comfortable with the staff and fellow students. Today, we are delighted to see him at ease, connected with his teachers, and truly feeling at home. We are sincerely grateful to Owl House for their faith in Aryan and for patiently supporting him as he takes steady steps towards achieving his long-term goals.



# FEATHERS IN OUR CAP: A YEAR OF **IMPACT**

## Launch of The Owl House Neurodiversity Fellowship

The Owl House Neurodiversity/Fellowship is our humble big step towards pioneering an initiative designed to strengthen the neurodiversity landscape in Goa by cultivating a skilled, empathetic, and socially committed workforce.

Through our years of work we have come to realise the great difficulty with which we have found dedicated and committed persons in the field. Many flee due to lack of structure and remuneration. Very many from the field of psychology do not see it is a viable field. The Owl House Neurodiversity Fellowship thus hopes to change this bit-by-bit each year.

The primary focus is to work with, fortify and strengthen existing efforts in Goa. Several schools with resource rooms run out of educators, many schools that wish to run resource rooms don't know where to begin, and the fellowship invariably ensures a steady availability of working individuals in the field, year on year.

Each year, the fellowship selects up to 12 graduates fluent in English, from diverse personal, educational and professional backgrounds, and places them on a 14-month learning and fieldwork journey. Every fellow receives a monthly stipend of ₹15,000.

#### Fellowship Structure:

Phase	Duration	Focus
Training	2 Months	Foundations in neurodiversity, psychology, diagnostics, sex education, classroom practice, policy history, and strategy.  Focus on applicable skills over theory.
Fieldwork	12 Months	Rotations across <b>6 partner centres in North Goa</b> , including schools, out-of-school programmes and vocational centres.  A pair of fellows spends <b>2 months per centre.</b>

Macro - Systems-level thinking and policy

## Sufiyan Panna's Imagination Comes to Life at MOG and Serendipity

Sufiyan Panna has been a student of The Owl House straight out of school. He has a keen and almost obsessive interest in art and drawing. He enjoys making fantastical creatures, monsters that have characteristics and back stories. When we invited the Musuem of Goa to view his work, they were quick to offer him the space he deserved as part of an art showcase. The entire Owl House student body and staff went to see this exhibition. This particular opportunity proved instrumental in getting Sufiyan a spot at the Serendipity Arts Festival. There he displayed his work with a participating artist, Pakhi Sen and they co-created the Fantasy Forest installation!

## Serendipity Arts Festival

The Owl House's association with the Serendipity Arts Festival began well in advance. Having the opportunity to work with such a large endeavour and a landmark event of the State was a real honour and an opportunity of mammoth proportions for a variety of reasons. We associated with the festival on 4 counts.

- 1. Sufiyan as a participating co-artist
- 2. In sensitising the entire team of 300 volunteers of The Serendipity Arts Festival
- 3. Facilitated an Expressive Arts Therapy workshop for visitors of the festival
- 4. Set up a sensory room to support neurodiverse individuals in attendance of the festival

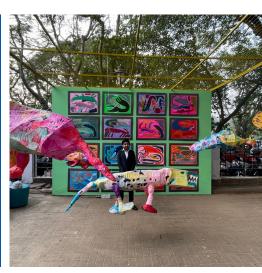
While all of these activities helped us achieve a wider impact and reach, the more specific achievements of these engagements are also worth understanding

Sufiyan's presence was not just a matter of impact on the visitors of the festival but also a matter of impact and realisation for his family and more importantly for Sufiyan himself. It was through this installation that he was able to see his vision materialise and interact with his own art. It was truly an opportunity for him to see himself a working artist and to catapult him towards building interest and business capacities in the field. He is now learning to digitise his work through Digital Media lessons at The Owl House.

The sensitisation training for the volunteers of the Serendipity Arts Festival ensured that onground facilitators will be able to identify, assist and direct neurodiverse individuals within the attending crowd. The training not only equipped the volunteers to work with neurodiverse folk but be sensitive and compassionate towards attendees over all.









#### Christmas Mela - December 2024

The Christmas Mela is an annual offering by The Owl House which brings together the community of entrepreneurs and rakes in on the Christmas Spirit. The evening market is a place for fun games and community connection for our students and all the visitors. Live music, karaoke, games, food stalls, decorations and more importantly, the people bring this event to life and is something that we all look forward to all year round.



## Thrift Mela

Sustainability is our mantra in life. We make sustained efforts towards the success of our students. We want our students to sustain an independent, meaningful life and career. And we have gotten to enjoy the fruits of our labour only through sustained and collective action. So throwing together a thrift sale was just the thing for us to do for awareness and outreach. Our community of parents, students, educators, Directors and well wishers came together to shower us with a wide variety of items. We were able to record a footfall of over 100 individuals and a sale in thousands that went on to support the centre.

## Community Heroes Lunch

The Community Heroes lunch was a Labour Day event ideated and executed by the Owl Cafe student employees. The intention was to engage with the real community heroes and express our heartfelt gratitude for the tireless and sometimes invisible work that they do.









## Women's Day Lunch

Urjaa, by Debarati Chakraborty & Jade D, was born with a mission to change lives, touch hearts and make people feel loved and supported. Their gatherings, workshops and collaborations are rooted in this purpose. For their Women's Day Celebration, Urjaa extended this mission beyond their circle. They chose The Owl House, a women-led neurodiverse skilling center feeding into our mission of providing our student employees real-world opportunities. Such engagements foster employment, independence and inclusion. Our Women's Day meal was wholesome and catered to the client's requirements for gluten/soy-free recipes which were ideated by our Head chef Mathson Miranda and cooked by in-house student chefs Tessel, Ariana & Sitali. The menu had shami kebabs with chickpea, spice & gram flour; spinach cheese balls with homegrown ingredients and a chia pudding in almond milk with fresh fruits. All the 30 guests on Women's Day had only marvelous things to say about the food. Urjaa Wellness was overjoyed and proud of this partnership and we can only look forward to many more of such opportunities.



Celebrate Aldona is a flagship event of the Aldona Panchayat that invites local entrpreneurs to rent out stalls at a nominal price. It is a grand and festive opportunity for the community to come together and enjoy the products of local flavour and innovation. # **DEVELOPING TRANSFERABLE SKILLS** AND MAKING SALEABLE PRODUCTS

The core objective of the store management & culinary production courses is to equip students with vital skills for effective store management and production roles. These curriculums enable them to actively get habituated to schedules and standards of a common workplace of a small business. It's essential that we make products that have a high degree of involvement of the student in the production process. Students are involved in weighing/measuring ingredients, making large batches, distributing the large batch into individual products as well as sanitising and sealing the final product. Through our jar products We create something delicious, consumable and fast-moving, ensuring that our students find recurring work. We want customers to choose our products because of their quality and affordability, not out of charity or sympathy. Our goal is to produce items that stand on their own merit, reflecting the skill and craftsmanship of our students. We've been kept busy at The Owl House in curating a product range that can grow over time and generate income for our students in the long run.

Our art programme has seen immense growth through the last year, what with Sufiyan's success on a large commercial platform and the birth and constant sale of handcrafted small batch items such as bracelets, pendants and bleach-dyed t-shirts. These products help our students hone fine motor skills while creating products that are hard to resist for buyers at the centre store or pop-ups.







An output of our gardening programme is the annual yield and sale of homegrown peppercorn that many patrons find themselves coming back for. We hope to receive retainer bulk orders in the future as a way of generating a steady income stream for our students.







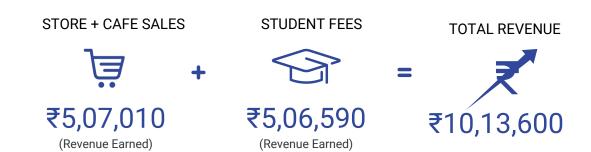


# **REVENUE BREAKDOWN: WHERE OUR GROWTH COMES FROM**

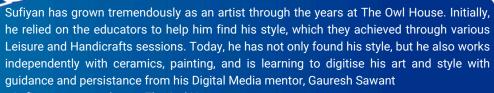




# STUDENT STORIES
